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For Builders Bold Pastor Joel Gawrisch

These are bold and exciting times. A recent article in *The Hugonian* pointed out that this will be the first time in 40 years that a new worship facility will be built in the City of Hugo. Many people are coming together both within our congregation and from the community in support of this effort. There is just something about bricks, mortar and ministry that gets the blood pumping.

The Apostle may never have built a bricks-and-mortar church, but he knew a thing or two about church building. In his second letter to the Corinthian congregation – listed as 1 Corinthians in the Scriptures – Paul writes of building and foundations. But at the same time, he stresses the importance of ministry over the bricks and mortar.

By the grace God has given me, I laid a foundation as an expert builder, and someone else is building on it. But each one should be careful how he builds. ¹¹ For no one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ. ¹² If any man builds on this foundation using gold, silver,

costly stones, wood, hay or straw, ¹³ his work will be shown for what it is, because the Day will bring it to light. It will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test the quality of each man's work. ¹⁴ If what he has built survives, he will receive his reward. 1 Corinthians 3:10-14

As we anticipate breaking ground for our new facility in Hugo, we do so with the same understanding as Paul and of previous generations who built churches for eternity. These thoughts are aptly captured in Herman Stuempfle's hymn *For Builders Bold Whose Vision Pure:*

For builders bold whose vision pure Saw more than brick or stone,

Who laid in hope foundations sure With Christ the cornerstone;

For those who honored your commands And trusted your strong Word,

Who offered faithful hearts and hands, We give you thanks, O Lord.

As here they raised a soaring spire Which thrusts toward worlds above,

So may our prayers, like tongues of fire, Leap kindled

by your love.

And let your living Word descend As seed on waiting hearts

And, fruitful, there its grace extend To earth's most distant parts.

Here saints newborn you generate Through water and the Word,

Through bread and cup communicate The gift of Christ the Lord.

We gather, Christ's own family, Christ's meal of love we share.

Come, help us live in unity, Each other's burdens bear.

(Christian Worship Hymnal Supplement #775 st. 1-3)

By God's redeeming grace, we break ground for a ministry tool that will continue to reach hearts adrift, crush hearts of stone, cleanse hearts of sin, and nurture hearts of love for lives of service to him who is our cornerstone, Christ Jesus. At such an historic time, it is good for us to remember the "builders bold" before us. The following excerpt is from the dedicatory page of the North St. Paul facility's dedication service on May 24th, 1964:



Ground was broken for the North St. Paul facility on May 5th, 1963. Construction began the next day.

"Bless the Lord, O my soul; and all that is within me, bless His holy name. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits." Ps. 103, 1-2.

On this day of Dedication we recognize and acknowledge, above all, that it was God, the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost who alone made this day possible.

When our building program was inaugurated four years ago, we prayed: "Let Thine eyes, we pray Thee, be toward this place, where we propose to build a house of worship, of Christian education and fellowship to the glory of Thy holy name and for the salvation of souls purchased by the blood of Thine only-begotten Son. Bless and prosper the work which we are beginning in Thy name."

When we voted unanimously to begin construction, we prayed: "Now that we have finished planning, we come into Thy presence humbly to ask Thee to give us vision and courage and boldness to continue, and wholeheartedly and trustingly to begin actual construction of our planned church facilities."

When we broke ground for our new building, we prayed: "Grant grace unto all who will be engaged in the work of building, that the construction may be duly completed, that the building may then be set apart to Thy glory, that Thy holy name may be worshiped here, and that those who teach and learn here may grow in grace and in the knowledge of Thee."

When the cornerstone was laid, we prayed: "Prosper Thou us, O God, in this our undertaking. Give to the members unity of counsel, purity of intention, and a supreme purpose to advance Thy glory in promoting the extension and interests of Thy holy Church. Guard by Thy providence everything pertaining to this building, which has been begun in Thy name and in reliance on Thy blessing, that it may be successfully completed."

As we thus entrusted the beginning, the continuance and the completion of our program into the gracious and almighty hands of God, we now give praise, honor and thanksgiving only to God who has answered our many prayers and blessed us and permitted us to complete our program.

With humble, grateful and joyful hearts we dedicate this House of Worship, Education and Fellowship to the glory of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost.

May God bless with His grace all who enter here to worship Him!

May we also join our forebears in seeking the Lord's blessing on our project and future ministry. In loving kindness he has gathered us around his pure Word and sacraments and has kept us in the faith in Christ Jesus. By grace he has formed this congregation and has given us

every spiritual blessing in Christ. Now, we come before him in worship and praise for his goodness as we break ground and re-dedicate ourselves to his Kingdom work.

Let Us Worship Him

How do I love me? Let me count the ways! Part II By Jon Zabell

This article is part of a series addressing key worship concepts. As we work with these concepts, our worship will be enriched for the sake of both members and guests. It will be faithful to Scripture, to our Lutheran heritage, and to our challenges and opportunities as 21st century followers of Jesus. The author of this month's article - Pastor Jon Zabell - has served churches in Omaha, NE, and Green Bay, WI. He is the Director of the Commission on Worship and chaired the committee that prepared resources to introduce Christian Worship Supplement.

Which kinds of gifts are appropriate here?

On the football field, a Christian quarterback worships God by using his athletic gift to the best of his ability. This is worship in its broad sense. But as wonderful as his gift may be, it won't help him or his fellow believers proclaim the gospel at worship. In humility and Christian love, he sets this particular gift aside. Let's say this quarterback has also been given a unique ability to encourage others. Such a gift isn't nearly as amazing in the eyes of our world as is his athletic prowess. But

in his conversations with his pastor and his fellow members, he gives consistent support and encouragement. Then, when they see him in church, they are reminded of his encouragements as together they proclaim the saving works of Christ. In worship, his gift of encouragement shines.

Probably no one is asking if he can use his athletic skills in worship. But what about a clarinet student who is just learning to play? What about an accordionist? What about a rock musician? What about a clown? What about a bagpiper? Each Christian can praise God with each talent he or she's been given. But there is a time and a place for everything, and there is a difference between private praise and public proclamation. There is a difference between the unique gifts of each member and gifts that the entire body needs. In sum: there is a difference between the doctrine of vocation and the theology of worship. When it comes to our worship, it's not enough to ask, "Will this talent praise God?" We need to

ask: "Will it help to proclaim Christ's saving work?" "Will it edify God's people?" Wise leaders will remember the purpose of corporate worship and apply the principles they've learned to each situation. Loving leaders will teach their people that the kind of worship that happens in our weekly services isn't me time. It's group time.

It starts with us. Love forbids us from assuming the worst about our brother's worship practices. Love encourages us to consult with neighboring congregations when trying something new. Love also requires us to speak gently with others about something we recognize as unwise. Love is a pastor, a worship leader, or a musician who is willing to listen to constructive criticism from brothers and sisters in Christ. Love wants the saving work of Jesus to be the theme and center of all worship. Paul writes, "Let the word of Christ richly dwell within you, with all wisdom teaching and admonishing one another with psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with thankfulness in your

hearts to God” (Colosians 3:16, NASB).

Finally, to think like a group is to remember who we are. Peter writes, “You are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people belonging to God, that you may proclaim the praises of him who brought you out of darkness into his wonderful light” (1 Peter 2:9). God has forgiven our ugly sinful pride. He has reconciled us to himself by the blood of Jesus Christ, and he has reconciled us to one another. We’re not a group because we say we are. We’re a group because God says we are, and he can’t lie.

How good and pleasant it is when pastors, musicians, and people in our congregations are all saying, “Jesus must become greater and I must become less!” How good and pleasant it is when brothers live together in unity! (Psalm 133:1)

Freedom, Wisdom, Love

Though free, Luther saw commonality in worship

forms to be beneficial for the good of the common people.

Now when your people are confused and offended by your lack of uniform order, you cannot plead, “Externals are free. Here in my own place I am going to do as I please.” But you are bound to consider the effect of your attitude on others. By faith be free in your conscience toward God, but by love be bound to serve your neighbor’s edification, as also St. Paul says, Romans 14 [15:2], “Let each of us please his neighbor for his good, to edify him.” For we should not please ourselves, since Christ also pleased not himself, but us all.¹

The Lutheran church wrestled with freedom and wisdom in worship during the time leading up to the Formula of Concord. The basic confessional texts regarding freedom and wisdom in worship are found in Augustana VII, XV, XXVI, XXVIII with corresponding coverage in the Apology, along with Formula of Concord X. Without question, they remove

the church’s outward form of worship from the question of salvation. They keep it, however, firmly in the area of wisdom and love.

In worship there is a wide space between what is commanded and what is forbidden: everything between lies in the area of Christian freedom. Freedom in worship must be balanced by wisdom and love. Freedom that is not normed by love damages the body of Christ. Freedom that is not normed by wisdom fails in the stewardship of the means of grace. You may be free in making changes to worship practices; we will fight for your freedom to do just that. Do not, however, demand that we always call it wise.²


expectations and standards for each of the core subject areas—reading, math, writing, speaking, listening, and language.


Revelation Rewind




Worship & Bible Study Times
